

Cherishing the Ordinary

One of my favorite stories in the Bible is that of the apostle Paul visiting Athens, recorded in Acts 17:16-33. Verse 21 says, "Now all the Athenians and the foreigners who lived there would spend their time in nothing except telling or hearing something new."

Novelty, or at least variety, is important for us. It adds color to life and helps to keep us interested and engaged. We tire of even our favorite food if we eat it, and only it, for every meal. That said, as Acts 17:21 suggests, it's easy to let a healthy appreciation of novelty, variety, and change turn into a preference for the extraordinary over the ordinary. Though that's a recipe for disappointment, it's a trap into which we often fall.

The ordinary things we fail to appreciate often became ordinary only because they were widely recognized as good, and assiduously cultivated and widely distributed to meet popular demand.

Consider, for example, the food, water, electricity, music, and health care to which we now have routine access and therefore consider ordinary.

One hundred years ago in New Jersey, to be able to eat an orange at Christmas — or any other time — would have been an extraordinary luxury.

So would air conditioning, the opportunity to hear a performance of the Emperor Concerto at home, or immunity to polio by vaccination. Familiarity often breeds contempt. When what was once extraordinary becomes commonplace, we may fail to appreciate it. We may even try to escape from what is good due to its familiarity. My desire to leave the comforts of home for the rigors of the wilderness is due in no small part to the fact that I take those comforts for granted and crave a change of environment.

As we begin this new academic year, God invites us to cultivate and appreciate the ordinary good gifts he provides us, e.g. food and shelter, worship and fellowship at Messiah, education and health, and the love of family and friends. So much of what we consider ordinary was once extraordinary and comes to us through the work of our neighbors and forbears. As we work, play, rest, and love, we can thank God for the privilege of being part of a rich and venerable web of giving and receiving. Most of all, we can thank God for the gift of his Son, Jesus Christ, who has taken our sin and guilt on himself and justified our existence. In Jesus, the extraordinary became ordinary, and as a result our ordinary lives have taken on extraordinary significance and joy.

As we enter this new season of life together, may the extraordinary joy and hope of life in Christ abound in you.


