

Welcoming and Faithful

Six years ago (May/June 2013), I wrote here a column entitled, "Hospitality and Faithfulness". I mentioned then how difficult it can be to know to what extent we should engage with people who believe and practice things we consider false, harmful, and/or confused. Since 2013, discernment hasn't become much easier. On one hand, we want to welcome and be hospitable to our neighbors. On the other hand, we want to be faithful to the truth, and not condone or facilitate the spread of falsehood, harm, or confusion.

Life is difficult, as are the choices it presents us. But God has not left us alone to fend for ourselves. As we heard in our scripture readings and choir anthem on Pentecost Sunday, the Holy Spirit is the Spirit of truth, and guides us into all truth. Jesus is the way, the truth, and the life, and the Holy Spirit keeps us in him. Living in the truth will sometimes make us unpopular and cause us to suffer. We'll suffer even from our internal disagreements about what is true and how important it is that we insist on that truth.

Truths to which Christians hold that are likely to make us unpopular in contemporary American society include our perspectives on life and death (e.g. euthanasia, abortion, and suicide), and on marriage and sexuality (e.g. what marriage is, divorce, and marriage as the only appropriate place for sexual relationship). How do we welcome people from whom we differ on these important matters while remaining faithful to the truth?

One example: in a worship service, everyone is welcome, though not all behavior is welcome and not all beliefs are affirmed. There is a higher bar to become a member of the congregation than there is to attend a worship service. Membership includes affirming certain doctrines (e.g. those in the Creed) and rejecting others. So those whom we welcome to worship we may not welcome to membership.

How about when we're the ones on the outside, wondering to what extent we should participate in institutions of ambiguous moral standing? We're in this situation when we decide how to invest our money — a topic addressed in a March/April 2017 Adult Forum series entitled *Choose Life: A Lenten Look at How We Spend Time, Treasure, and Talent.* Another perennial concern is what our children are exposed to in school or among their peers. These questions are real and important. There are beliefs and practices we may willing to tolerate as adults, but unwilling to subject our children to. In these cases, here are a few questions we can ask ourselves:

How important is this? To what extent can I be accommodating?

What options exist?

Must I decide this alone? If not, with whom can I share my concern and think through this? If it's important enough, can I organize a group of like-minded people to act in concert rather than individually?

If I'm reacting to something I perceive to be wrong, can I articulate what should happen instead and why?

How can I be part of the solution? Are there existing channels for me to voice my concerns? How can I establish a positive relationship with, for example, a teacher or administrator who could help?

Much more could be said, but this is a place to begin. If you are facing issues like these and would like help, please contact me. I'd welcome the opportunity to help you navigate through them.

We live in a fallen world, and we are all sinners. But we are redeemed sinners, and God has not left us alone. Life is difficult, but not dreadful. Knowing that God has given us the Spirit of truth, let us avail ourselves of the tools of the Spirit, e.g. scripture, prayer, and the wisdom accumulated in the Church over many generations, to discern what is best in an imperfect world.

NEW JERSEY HEALTH INSURANCE MANDATE

As of January 1, 2019, New Jersey requires its residents to maintain health insurance. The law requires you and your family to have minimum essential health coverage throughout 2019 and beyond, unless you qualify for an exemption. Failure to have health coverage or qualify for an exemption will result in a Shared Responsibility Payment when you file your 2019 New Jersey Income Tax return. Exemptions are available, e.g. if you are not required to file a 2019 New Jersey Income Tax return or if you participate in a religious healthcare cost sharing program. I am now off to pursue an advanced master's degree in philosophy and theology at Yale Divinity School. So, I will not be too far away, and I will look forward to visiting you all!


