

Giving Thanks in All Circumstances

I'm excited! I'm excited about Reformation Day, All Saints Day, Thanksgiving, Advent, and Christmas, about the beginning of a new liturgical year, about baptisms and new members joining our congregation, about opportunities to worship, learn, and enjoy one another's company. God has blessed us in so many ways, and holidays help us to remember and thank God for his good gifts.

Partly because of all the celebrating, holidays are not easy times for everyone. When things aren't going well, seeing everyone else happy can make us feel isolated and guilty for not being as cheerful and grateful as those around us. Especially in these circumstances, it is good to remember that we not alone. Even the most apparently cheerful, put-together, well-adjusted people suffer and feel lonely, sad, and estranged. Christians are baptized into congregations, and not as independent believers, in part so that we'll realize that we all go through difficult times and can help one another through them. In congregations, we build the bonds of solidarity and kinship that mark us as Jesus' disciples, obeying his command in John 13:34 that we love one another.

Congregations provide those of us who are grieving with occasions to celebrate and give thanks in the midst of our distress. We don't need to be happy in order to participate. What we do together does not depend on how each of us is feeling at the moment, but allows us to step out of ourselves and join the spirit of the community, in whatever state we're in individually. We don't have to pretend everything is fine in order to worship, give thanks, or receive God's hope, peace, joy, and love from our Christian community. We're here for each other. We can and should share our burdens with trusted sisters and brothers in Christ, so that together we can bear one another's burdens and so fulfill the law of Christ (Galatians 6:2).

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK CONTINUED

Last week, we sang two hymns of praise and thanksgiving that were written in times of extreme hardship. The first was *Now Thank We All Our God* (LBW 533), which we sang on Sunday, October 13. Martin Rinkhart, a Lutheran pastor in the town of Eilenburg, near Leipzig in what is now Germany, wrote the hymn text in the midst of the carnage of the Thirty Years War in the early seventeenth century. Because Eilenburg was a walled city, people from out of town fled there for refuge, resulting in overcrowding, hunger, and disease. Pastor Rinkhart often conducted burial services for dozens of people a day. He eventually fell ill himself and lost his wife and two fellow pastors to disease. It was in these circumstances that Pastor Rinkhart offered God and the church his now classic hymn of thanksgiving.

The second hymn was *It Is Well* (LBW 346), one of Anne Bolick's requests for her memorial service on October 19. The first stanza reads, "When peace like a river attendeth my way, when sorrows like sea billows roll; whatever my lot, thou hast taught me to say, "It is well, it is well with my soul." The prosperous Chicago lawyer Horatio Spafford wrote these words following the death of his four daughters in a shipping collision in the Atlantic Ocean in November 1873. Spafford didn't pretend that all was well, but knew that even in the midst of terrible circumstances, the peace of God that surpasses all understanding was guarding his heart and his mind in Christ Jesus (Philippians 4:7). Knowing that, he was able to write without irony, "It is well, it is well with my soul."

In this season of celebration and thanksgiving, our congregation is at once a community of hope and desperation, of peace and turmoil, of joy and sorrow, of love and loneliness. God has cobbled us together from many walks of life to join in celebration and lament, in thanksgiving and consolation, in praise and in prayer. He has not left us alone, but has made us members of Messiah to receive his gifts and to share them with one another and with his hurting world. In whatever circumstances we find ourselves, we can join in saying and singing, "Thanks be to God!"



Protect Messiah from the flu

Get your seasonal flu shot now, available at most pharmacies. In addition to protecting you, vaccines protect vulnerable people around you for whom infection could cause serious illness. The cost of the shot is covered by most health insurance plans. If you're paying out of pocket, the standard version of the shot is available at Costco for \$20, and their pharmacy is open to nonmembers.

The new year is good time to review your will and estate plan, and if you'd like to update them, now is a good time to make an appointment with your lawyer or financial advisor. Leaving a bequest in a will is one way to make a long-term investment in Messiah's ministry. Another way is to designate Messiah as a beneficiary of a bank account, life insurance policy, or brokerage account. Designating Messiah as a beneficiary of an account or policy must be done with the company with whom you hold the account. It can usually be done at no cost and without a lawyer, and typically avoids the probate process and fees. Tax Tip: Qualified Charitable Distributions from an IRA

Federal law allows taxpayers who are at least age 70 ½ and owners of Individual Retirement Accounts (IRAs) to distribute money from an IRA directly to a charity of the owner's choice. This is called a qualified charitable distribution (QCD) and has the advantage of not counting as federally taxable income, but still counting toward a required minimum distribution. QCDs have been possible for many years, but in the past two years, with so many more people taking the standard deduction instead of itemizing, QCDs are advantageous for many more of us than they used to be, especially for owners of traditional (rather than Roth) IRAs. It's a way to reduce income without having to deduct it (because you never receive it -- it goes directly from your IRA account to the charity).
