

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FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Hospitality and Faithfulness

 ${f I}$ n our First Lesson (Acts 11:1-

18) this past Sunday, the Fifth Sunday of Easter (April 28), we heard some early Christians ask the apostle Peter, "Why did you go to uncircumcised men and eat with them?" When Peter told them about his vision of the sheet and his meeting with Cornelius, says Acts 11:18, "they were silenced. And they praised God, say-



ing, 'Then God has given even to the Gentiles the repentance that leads to life.'"

Even to the Gentiles?! For Peter's audience, that was quite a step. The God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob was welcoming people and practices foreign and even abhorrent to the observant Jews of the early Christian church. Mosaic law included provisions for the care of strangers, but to be counted among those who ate unclean foods was something quite different.

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FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK (CONT'D)

The magnitude of the issue may be difficult for us at Messiah to comprehend, as few of us consider dietary restrictions an essential part of our religious observance. At the same time, we do things in certain ways because we value them, and we hope that others will learn to value them too. The way we worship, our creeds and confessions, our budget, and the way we treat each other all reflect our priorities, and we don't want people running roughshod over what we cherish. Congregations that don't share common values fall apart because where nothing matters, anything goes. Perhaps that makes it a little easier for us to sympathize with Peter's audience at the beginning of Acts 11.

Being hospitable to others and yet faithful to what (or whom) we value is no easy task. We need God's help. As parents know, loving a child does not mean surrendering to him or her. So too, God our Father loves, values, and welcomes us so much that he opens himself to us in his Word – spoken, heard, written and finally incarnated in Jesus, who came to us with us to dwell. In God's Word, the Holy Spirit teaches us what to value and how to act accordingly, allowing us lots of freedom for working that out in our own context.

We need God's help to discern the essential from the superficial, the central from the peripheral. We won't always agree, but as we see in Acts, disagreement is not new to the body of Christ, nor is it necessarily debilitating or permanent. We are blessed at Messiah to have a delightfully low level of conflict in our congregation, for which we can thank God heartily!

On Pentecost Sunday (May 19), we will have a chance to welcome people different from ourselves to our fellowship hour. Members of the Peace Islands Institute (PII) will be visiting to share food and conversation with us. You can read more about the PII and the event on page 5. Few, if any, of our visitors will be Christians. That is an essential difference, but it need not prevent us from eating and talking together. We can be faithful, incarnational witnesses of God's love for us by welcoming the stranger, talking informally about what we believe and value, sharing our questions, and spending time on one another. I invite you to join me in being one such witness!

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
GARDENING UPDATE

After months of waiting, the bulbs that Messiah's volunteer gardeners planted last fall finally emerged from their winter hibernation and bloomed, decking the grounds in bright colors. Dozens of daffodils, a splash of red tulips, and scattered other bulbs emerged and are a sight for sore eyes.

There will be more horticultural excitement over the next several weeks. Azaleas and hydrangeas from our Easter celebration will be planted permanently, and the pots which held greens and berries over the winter will be planted with colorful annuals.

The beautiful new landscaping on the side of the church features azaleas and a rhododendron

which ought to be coming into bloom soon, along with the azaleas in planters flanking the side walk, which already have healthy-looking flower buds.



The biggest piece of

news is that by the summer, the Nassau Street side of the church should be planted with cherry trees which will sport clouds of white and pink flowers next spring, bright green boxwood hedges lining either side of the entrance walk, and dark green columnar boxwoods surrounded by variegated liriope anchoring the front corners. A variety of annuals will be planted along the path as well, for color all summer.

The fun part of gardening is surveying the beautiful results, but alas, there is a lot of work involved also. Potted plants especially need regular watering during sunny summer days, and weeds poke their annoying heads up just about everywhere and require a firm and pitiless hand. There will also be quite a bit of planting of flowering annuals and perennials to do in the next month or so. 
