

ASCENSION THEN AND NOW

Happy Easter! The rigors of Lent heighten my appreciation of Easter, and Easter joy mixed with the extra light and sunshine we're getting each day turns even watching my car accumulate pollen into a simple pleasure. Ascension Day will be May 14 this year and, partly because as the fortieth day of Easter it's always a Thursday, is a feast we often overlook.

Jesus ascension is well worth dwelling on, however. It's a source of wonder, joy, and encouragement for many reasons, which, if you're interested, you can learn more about by listening to the Ascension 2012 sermon I preached on May 20 of that year, available on the Messiah website. For now, though, I'd like to focus on one aspect of Jesus' ascension – it's novel, pathbreaking nature and what that means for us.

I love the book of Acts. The Acts of the Apostles, the full name of the book, picks up from the Gospel of Luke with a more detailed account of Jesus' ascension than the Gospel provides. Jesus ascends in Acts 1:9, and in verse 10 two men in white robes find his disciples gazing up after him into heaven. I like to think of the disciples at that moment, who, trying to wrap their minds around Jesus' resurrection, now have to rearrange their mental furniture once more to accommodate his ascension. I imagine they had had easier months.

But as bewildering as Jesus' post-mortem behavior must have been for his disciples, it was also encouraging. Jesus' resurrection and ascension introduced new and exciting alternatives to the conventional wisdom of their day (and ours) that says death is the end of the road.

"Correct me if I'm wrong, but I don't think that's been done before," I imagine Thomas saying to Andrew after the ascension.

"How about Elijah?"

"Yes, but leaving aside that he hadn't died first, Elijah had wheels, which puts Jesus in a different class altogether."

It's speculative, I know, but plausible. The important thing is that in his ascension Jesus, having taken on our human lot and reconciled us to God, broke a death-defying path for us to the presence of his — and now our — Father. He was doing a new thing and emboldened his disciples to get off the sofa and break some new ground themselves in light of his Resurrection & Ascension Reality. "Get out there – I'm with you" is one paraphrase of Jesus' Great Commission in Matthew 28:19-20. Acts is a record of the results – messy to be sure, but inspired and guided by the Holy Spirit.

Like us, Jesus' first disciples didn't have a perfect idea of how to respond to his ascension. They tried things and learned by doing, evidenced by some of my favorite phrases in scripture:

"It seemed good to the Holy Spirit and to us..." (Acts 15:28, NIV)

"We have not even heard that there is a Holy Spirit." (Acts 19:2, NIV)

"If it's worth doing, it's worth doing badly," seems to have been their motto, and it's one that encourages me when I reflect on my incomplete understanding, cowardice, and apathy in carrying out the Great Commission. "Sin boldly," said Martin Luther, as an encouragement to fellow sinners to soldier on in their calling as ambassadors for Christ despite our Jonah-like character flaws and lack of enthusiasm.

Jesus is not only with us, but is ahead of us. His ascension visibly broke the glass ceiling between earth and heaven, between us and God, between a destiny of death and one of eternal life. Jesus bridged the gap we sometimes feel between the world of the Bible and the world we live in today by giving us the example of his inept, uncertain, and imperfect disciples. They are people to whom we can relate. We share their dubious credentials. We are recipients of the same grace and fellow members of God's improbable corps of ambassadors, inspired by the Holy Spirit to blunder boldly into the world God loves and came to save. In his ascension, Jesus the perfect pathbreaker opened the kingdom of heaven to all believers. Through the witness of his disciples then and now, he emboldens us to embark on the path he has broken.

"I just wanted to say a few words about our Prayer Shawl Ministry.

We began our small group in 2006 (almost 10 years ago) and promptly named ourselves "Messiah's Mantles". Mildred Coyner offered her home as a meeting place, and we set a schedule to meet once a month for knitting and fellowship. Over the years, we have given away hundreds and hundreds of shawls, which is pretty amazing considering it takes 3 skeins of yarn and many hours/months to finish each one. The shawls are knit in patterns of (3) symbolizing the Holy Trinity knit 3, purl 3 (Father, Son, and Holy Spirit).



This ministry is as therapeutic and comforting for the knitters - as it is for the recipients. Over the years, we have shared our joys and our sorrows in fellowship as we knit and pray for the receiver of the shawl(s).

As you saw today, our completed shawls were blessed during the worship service, and will then be given to the sick, the bereaved or anyone in need of comfort and prayers. Shawls are also given to thank, or to celebrate – the birth of child, a wedding, a graduation.

Luckily, Sunday School teachers Ryan Spaude and Miranda Hempel were joined by several noble volunteers, Debbie Baer, John Wackerman, and Trish Oehlrich, and confirmation/Sunday School students Dan Baer, Jonathan Wackerman, and Drew and Katy Von Bargen. Many hands make light work, so everything was ready to go when the onslaught began. There was a congenial mix of congregants and neighborhood families; regulars and newcomers who just happened to see the sign on the front lawn. Fourteen-plus children showed up with parents in tow.

Children and parents immediately settled down to the task of decorating bags for the treasures they would find in the hunt, and also decking out straw hats in lively colors with fake flowers, rhinestones, ribbons, and stickers. The room was filled with concentrated energy, as the children focused on the task at hand, with the occasional technical assist from a parent. Some of the boys opted to decorate hats as well, forgoing the lavender, pink, and yellow options in favor of fireengine red.

In case anyone's energy started to flag, there was a spread of breakfast snacks including croissants, mini-strudels, muffins, grapes, and other easy to eat munchies. For the parents, Debbie Baer made coffee, which was much appreciated. 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SUNDAY SCHOOL STUDENTS FIT THE BATTLE OF JERICHO, AND MORE

In the last two months or so, the Sunday School students have had a variety of experiences. They have tried fishing (even if they were only paper fish) after learning about Jesus appearing to the disciples after his resurrection and helping them with their fishing technique. They have made paper boats which float across buckets of water quite handily in homage to Noah, Jonah, the apostles, and Paul, among others, who all had memorable boating experiences the



students read about. And the students created a cardboard Jericho, complete with Rahab's house, which they marched around, blasting away on plastic flutes (an affordable substitute for the trumpets actually used). They even made up their own songs featuring the names of the twelve apostles as an aid to memorizing them (it worked!)



During Lent, we studied the Gospel accounts of our Lord's passion and resurrection, continuing after Easter with the descriptions of his appearances to his followers during the forty days before his ascension.

"Doubting" Thomas came in for some interesting discussion.

Currently, in addition to the new material introduced every week, the students are working on a paper mosaic representing all the stories and lessons from the year, an aesthetically pleasing way of reviewing what they have learned..


