

AUTUMN AND ANGER

I love the autumn – what the poet John Keats called "season of mists and mellow fruitfulness". But autumn can be a stressful time, and sometimes we find ourselves less mellow than the season would suggest. Stress makes it easier for us to get angry, to lose control of our tongues, and to hurt others.

In a recent article in *Concordia Theology*, Professor Jeffrey Gibbs of Concordia Seminary writes on *The Myth of "Righteous Anger": What the Bible Says about Human Anger*. The article is available online at <u>concordiatheology.org/2015/10/the-myth-of-righteous-anger-what-the-bible-says-about-human-anger</u>, and I commend it to you.

In his article, Professor Gibbs talks about how anger is sometimes spun as a desirable quality. For example, in this election season, we're pitched the idea that if a candidate is not angry about an issue, then they must not care about it. Anger is sold as an acceptable, even a desirable, way to motivate voters. Outrage becomes conflated with commitment, and invective with argument.

It's easy to blame politics and politicians for catering to our baser passions, but the fact is that they are ours. It's easier to get angry with someone with whom we disagree than to obey the Eighth Commandment and put the best construction on their words. It's less difficult and often more entertaining to caricature someone than to portray them in realistic detail and nuance. It's simpler to ignore, to shout, or to refuse to communicate than it is to listen, to speak considerately, to examine ourselves, and especially to repent and to reconcile with our neighbor. Anger requires much less of us than does compassion.

Anger can give us the illusion of having the moral high ground, insulating us from susceptibility to reason. That doesn't mean we can't get angry about injustice, sin, and death. The solution to anger is not to reconcile ourselves to evil, to extinguish our desire for good, or to excuse wrong. But being angry about something doesn't make us right about it. Anger is no substitute for the engagement and vulnerability we need to love our neighbors as mature and charitable conversation partners, open to the love of God permeating our thoughts, words, and deeds.

It's okay not to have all the answers or the last word. Just because a knowledgeable, popular, or powerful person says something doesn't make it true. But disagreeing doesn't require us to get angry. In fact, as Professor Gibbs shows in his article, scripture teaches us that anger, far from making us righteous, puts us in danger of grievous sin. God invites us be countercultural – instead of indulging our anger, to let God be the angry one. It's easier said than done, of course, but it's worth working on. In the words of G.K. Chesterton, "if a thing is worth doing, it's worth doing badly." We won't always succeed in dealing with our anger righteously, and for that we can seek forgiveness, remembering that in baptism, God has clothed us in his own righteousness.

This autumn and in the coming year, there are going to be times when it will be easier and more fashionable to clutch, justify, and cultivate our anger than it will be to entrust our situation and our feelings to God. At times like these, let's keep in mind that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us (Romans 5:8). And furthermore, God has given us a job to do, namely, to reflect his love for us through the ministry of reconciliation (2 Corinthians 5:17-21).

Neither anger, nor insults, nor power is a prerequisite for greatness. Jesus' words about greatness are as applicable to us, his disciples today, as they were when he spoke them to those who were angry at James and John:

" ^{42b} You know that those who are considered rulers of the Gentiles lord it over them, and their great ones exercise authority over them. ⁴³ But it shall not be so among you. But whoever would be great among you must be your servant, ⁴⁴ and whoever would be first among you must be slave of all. ⁴⁵ For even the Son of Man came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many." (Mark 11:42-45)

CORDS® achievement for Largest collection of clothing for recycle/donation. The current record is 153,240 items – that's a lot of clothing!



One of our other early lessons was about Ephesians 6: 11-17, concerning "the Armor of God," a nod to Roger's fascination with knights. We were able to get Roger a spiffy outfit including a helmet (salvation), shield (faith), belt (truth), breastplate (righteousness), sword (spirit), and shoes (preparation of the gospel of peace).

Right now, we have decided to go back to the very beginning, Genesis 1 and the creation of the world, and of Adam and Eve. One of our crafts was a spinner with a wedge cut out of the top layer. The bottom layer had six pie-shaped wedges, one for each day of creation, and the children made illustrations showing what was created on each day. When it was assembled, only one day showed through at a time, and the children had to remember which day it was. The drawings were all very imaginative and really represented what God had created that day.

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Dear Fellow Church Members,

It is with great hope for interest and success that I am introducing Operation Christmas Child to our church. This program is run by Samaritans Purse, a relief group run by Franklin Graham, son of evangelist Billy Graham. This group goes anywhere there is a natural disaster or need and brings volunteers and supplies. During the Christmas season they go to foreign countries where children have no Christmas, because of circumstances, and bring gifts to them. These are in the form of shoeboxes packed by people like us, with necessities they rarely or never have. Samaritans Purse also includes a small religious booklet and provides religious instruction to those who express interest.

If you are willing to pack a shoebox to send, a pamphlet is on the back pew with ideas-such as a little toy, toothbrush or soap-to name a few. These shoeboxes will be collected here at the church on November 22nd so that I may take them to a collection center, where they will be packed and taken down to North Carolina and shipped. Anyone interested in learning more may go to the Operation

Christmas Child website and have all your questions answered. It is my hope that each family here will contribute one or two shoeboxes, perhaps in place of a polyanna or Christmas cards. If you have a neighbor or friend whom you think would be interested, pass this on. Students could tell othersparticularly college students in dorms who have access to lots of others. In the past, we had a plumber in the church who asked all his customers to participate. What a blessingwe ended up with 100 shoe boxes.

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Men's Forum Update

Kick-Off Breakfast

On Saturday, October 3rd, ten men got together to talk about starting a Men's Forum to promote fellowship, spiritual growth and public witness.

Three other men expressed interest but could not attend. THIS IS NOT A CLOSED GROUP AND REMAINS OPEN TO ALL MEN –MESSIAH MEMBERS OR NOT! Feel free to join us and at least "kick the tires"!

We determined a men's group would be a good thing and agreed to meet monthly. To accommodate various schedules, there will be two group meetings a month. One will meet at 7:30 AM on the 2^{nd} Wednesday of the month at McCaffrey's Princeton on the 2^{nd} floor. The other group will meet at 9:00 AM on the 3^{rd} Saturday of the month at Wegmans Princeton on the 2^{nd} floor. Meeting times are subject to change– check the online church calendar for current information.

Both will discuss the same pre-announced subject for the month so men can come to either or both.

Nuts and Bolts of the Meetings

The sessions will start and end promptly, lasting one hour. Men can purchase breakfast or refreshment to enjoy during the session and bring their Bibles for reference. Besides the personal benefits of fellowship and spiritual growth, we hope to provide a Christian witness by men meeting in public with open Bibles.

The initial sessions will use an Inductive Bible study model and we'll start with the Book of Acts. (*If you want to know more about Inductive Bible studies, call me!*) Sessions will start with an opening prayer and a time to check in with each other. The topic for discussion will be introduced along with some starter questions and for the next half hour we'll have an open, non-judgmental discussion about the Scripture and what it may mean to us today. At the conclusion, we'll pick a subject for next month and have a closing prayer.

Pastor Martin will attend sessions as he is able, but this is a lay-led group. We are relying on the Holy Spirit to be our guide and leader. I'll be the coordinator in the beginning so any questions can be direct to me.
