

#### Christ is Risen!

It's hard to imagine better, more consequential news. Christ being risen means we can live hopefully, even cheerfully, in our fallen world. With Thomas, we

can touch Jesus' healed wounds and derive hope from that healing without shrinking from wounds and their pain. With Jesus' disciples on the road to Emmaus, we can grieve loss and still, with hearts aglow, be surprised by joy.



Christ being risen means that despite the coldness, apathy, and paranoid pursuit of self-interest that infest our

society, we can risk being honest and vulnerable, and loving sacrificially. Christ being risen emboldens us to take risks that don't make sense to those who haven't received or believed the good news of Jesus' resurrection.

Christ being risen means changed priorities. It's no more possible to die and rise with Jesus in Holy Baptism and expect our priorities to remain undisturbed than it is to live through an earthquake and expect the landscape to remain undisturbed. God loves us as we are, and too much to leave us that way. The tremors of Jesus' resurrection are, thank God, still rippling through our world, forming mountains of hope, springs of refreshment, valleys of rest, and rushing rivers of good will and well being.

#### FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK CONTINUED



#### SUNDAY SCHOOL UPDATE

#### Sunday School for Lent and Holy Week; Support for Feed My Starving Children

#### **Lessons for Lent**

During Lent, our Sunday School lessons focused on the meaning of the season, Jesus' last days and his sacrifice for us, augmented by related Bible stories.

This year, we all had special calendars for Lent with Bible passages, ideas, crafts, and activities for different days. We also had different colorful booklets about Lent, with quotes from Scripture and Bible stories. Some materials featured stickers to place in designated places on the illustrations. Stickers are always fun, and as we discovered, sometimes end up in surprising places! (Noses and foreheads are big favorites, but fingernails, clothing, and other body parts are popular, too.)





When Holy Week began, we traced Christ's footsteps (actually, on Palm Sunday, the donkey's steps!) from Jesus' exciting entry into Jerusalem through to his triumphant resurrection.

For Palm Sunday, we made pretend palm branches with dowels, sticks, pipe cleaners, and lots and lots of different-colored construction and tissue papers, culminating in a festive procession (punctuated by much palm-waving) down the center of the Sanctuary to the altar. There was a brief pause in front of the Palm Sunday banner for a photo-op, and then we all trooped back down the aisle and down to the Fellowship Hall.

#### The Feed My Starving Children Project

Because of the emphasis on charitable giving during Lent, the Sunday School picked a charity they wanted to help. We settled on *Feed My Starving Children*, a Christian charity founded in 1987. It is the original and largest supplier of nutritionally complete, packaged dry meals specifically formulated for people who are malnourished and starving. These meals are sent free of charge to partners in more than 70 countries who use the food to prevent starvation and curb malnourishment in children and families. Through working on this endeavor, the children gained insight into the bounty we enjoy through the grace of God, and how many children and families in this and other countries there are who are suffering and need help desperately.

Messiah's congregation responded to the Sunday School's campaign with incredible generosity, joined by others, as well. The initial goal was to raise \$400, which would sustain a family for a year. Instead, nearly \$1200 was donated, triple that amount. The children were involved throughout, and eagerly made thank you cards for the donors whose names we had. Many people generously put anonymous donations in the "charity box" which was placed in the church (exuberantly decorated by Katie Von Bargen).

The Sunday School wants to extend thanks to all, first for the good wishes and warmth shown by the congregation, and second, for the donations offered. This project was the result of a suggestion from a member of the congregation, who also kick-started the donations. We greatly appreciate this input.

#### Easter at Messiah's Sunday School

Easter Sunday is a double-pleasure for Messiah's Sunday School. Every year, we host a gala Easter Egg

Hunt for the children and grandchildren of our congregants, children from the neighborhood, and anyone else who wants to join the fun. It is so rewarding to see children overflowing with happiness and excitement as they dive almost head-first into the tables of craft projects and decorating supplies set out for them. (It need not be said, but nevertheless, here goes: the greatest pleasure, the most wonderful experience and opportunity on this blessed day, is the Easter service itself.)

This year we had that Easter craft favorite, hats, as well as glittery bags, and foam crowns and crosses to decorate with rhinestones,

stickers, flowers, ribbons, other oddments, and just plain crayons. There was a record turn-out, with many new families who heard about the Hunt from neighborhood friends, saw our signs on Nassau Street, or who read about the event in area newspapers or on our fabulous Facebook page. The event was called for 9:15, but people just couldn't wait, and started arriving from about 9:00 on. Luckily, thanks to our helpful volunteers, we were ready for the onslaught. Plates of croissants, rugelach, and blueberry muffins were ready and waiting to sustain everyone's creative energy, along with grapes, clementines, juice, and caffeine. As usual, we purposely over-bought, so that enough would be left over for an unofficial Fellowship Hour after the services, which is always fun.


